Art Nouveau Designs and Weaving Work of Wanda Bibrowicz-Wislicenus

**Abstract in English** of your presentation (maximum 1,000 characters)

Wanda Bibrowicz, who graduated in portrait painting from Breslauer Königliche Kunst- und Gewerbeschule and leaded its pioneer textile class between 1904-1911, is probably the best known Central Europe textile artist who practised Art Nouveau weaving. After her first pedagogic activity she run a successful private workshop in Szklarska Poręba as part of a famous artistic colony set with the poet Carl Hauptmann. Following her master and husband, Max Wislicenus' idea of "an artist as a weaver and a weaver as an artist", she was one of the first craftswomen to promote this approach. After poetic Art Nouveau designs of plants and animals, she developed her style to complex narrative scenes with elements of Art Deco but still a dreamy atmosphere. She is an author of over a hundred works, of which 46 survived the World War II, and are now part of several Polish and German collections. Although she played an important role in education of new designers in Breslau and afterwards in Pillnitz near Dresden (1920-1939), only a few specialists have heard of her work so far.

# Magdalena Długosz, M.A.

Since 2010 an assistant at the Maria Curie-Skłodowska University in Lublin at the Institute for Cultural Studies, Department of Comparative History of Art; studied in Lublin (Poland), Münster (Germany), Vienna and Innsbruck; beneficent of several research grants concerning mostly art and architecture of the 19th and 20th century in Poland and Central Europe. An author of articles on architecture of modernism (i.a. spa hotels), applied arts (i.a. Polish textiles), symbolist and expressionist painting. An editor of two volumes of collected papers (Sarmatism vs Orientalism in Central Europe, Vom Troglodytenland ins Reich der Scheherazade - Festschrift Piotr O. Scholz) and an author of a monograph in Polish "Oskar Kokoschka – a knight errant"; in 2012 coordinated an international conference on the work of Josef Strzygowski (proceedings in press); working on her doctoral thesis (at the Innsbruck University) concerning works of Oskar Kokoschka perceived in a wide context of spirituality of the 1900s.
